

G2R is off to a great start! Sunday mornings from 10:00 a.m. to 10:40 a.m. Emmanuel adults gather in the Parish Hall to continue our adventure through the Bible.


Our primary purpose is to familiarize everyone with the overall sweep of the Biblical drama and recognize the principal historical, theological, cultural and ethical themes inherent therein.

While most of us know many stories from the Bible, we are less certain about how everything fits comprehensively together.

Thus far we have discussed the nature of the religious impulse, how far back into human history it can be traced and how the impulse continues to be revealed in our own lives.

We considered truth and how many different ways it can be understood and encountered. Conversation then jumped into literary types and the variety of literary types present in the Bible.

In weeks to come we will learn about the distinctive characteristics of the Hebrew mind and how those characteristics are reflected in Biblical stories, as well as



principles of interpretation we must employ in order to authentically understand the intention of those who wrote the material.

It takes a while to lay the groundwork, but once done, **the Bible comes alive in ways never before enjoyed or imagined.** Everyone is encouraged to attend whenever time and personal schedules allow.

Over the past year, **the century-old stained glass windows were completely dismantled, cleaned, restored and painstakingly reassembled** by Gill and Victor Somers, owners of Somers Studios in Scottsville, VA.

Gill Somers, an ornamental and stained glass specialist for over 60 years, has performed work for some of the largest cathedrals in

the country.

Over \$3,000 has now been raised to support restoration of the Church's side windows, and yet another matching gift of \$500 has been offered!

All the lovely Easter lilies have been planted into the beds on the south side of the church thanks to John Geyer's hard work on that project. Each spring from now on, Emmanuel will have a beautiful garden filled with lilies.

When preparing the Altar for Communion, the Altar Guild uses several memorial items given by faithful parishioners in memory of family members and friends.

The **silver breadbox**, which holds the wafers, was given in memory of Frances Laughlin James by her husband Dr. A. O. James and family.

Elizabeth Moon Dennison provided the **silver wine chalice** as a memorial gift to Elizabeth Stone Moon.

Eleanor Watkins Vest and Mark Clark Vest were remembered by their parents with the gifts of the brass **Receiving Basin and Collection Plates**.

Emmanuel's Sunday School classes gave the Church the



Brass Missal Stand and Prayer Book in memory of William B. Hurt, Sunday School Superintendent for many years.

The Taylor family gave the **pair of five-branched brass candelabra** in memory of Rawley M. Taylor.

The **pair of three-branched brass candelabra** were given in memory of Frances Laughlin James by the Woman's Auxiliary.

The beautifully crafted walnut **Altar Rail**, suggesting a sense of sanctity in the altar area, was a gift from Gertrude Wilson Jones and Frances Hackett Rison as a memorial to Whitmell Tompkins Rison, their husband & brother.

Emmanuel's beautiful memorial gifts will always be part of the Church's treasures.

Are You Biblically Literate?



Shocking though true, **almost 90% of all Christians are Biblically illiterate.**

Most Christians know a few stories from the Bible but have no concept of the entire scope of the Biblical drama. Good church going folk may have heard of Abraham, Joshua and Stephen, but do not know what a covenant is, when the Promised Land was settled, or why Stephen was stoned.

So, you may ask, “What difference does it make? Not knowing that stuff hasn’t hurt me so far,” to which I might reply,

“You don’t know that!”

It is impossible for anyone in western civilization to claim to be “educated” without knowledge of the Bible. **Every facet of our cultural identity is inextricably bound to Biblical themes and images.** Literature, art, drama, law, philosophy, politics, music, economics, ethics, you name it and the Bible has had and continues to have a dramatic impact on how we live, think and perceive the world.

Interestingly, the notion of Biblical literacy is a relatively new phenomenon. **Until the middle of the 19th century, the Bible was the book children used when learning to read.**

Almost every household had a copy of the Bible and reading from it was far more common than today. Parents and grandparents would use the Bible to teach vocabulary, sentence structure, and composition. It was a primer for literacy and faith.

However, that is no longer the case. Young children may receive

a picture book of Bible stories from a pious aunt (or at least see one on the table at the doctor’s office) and turn through it, but never learn more than the pictures tell.

Those same children no longer receive religious education from their parents and depend on irregular attendance at Sunday School to set the story straight.

The result is what we now see — generations of people who know very little about the Bible, and therefore have little more than personal experience upon which to base their faith.


If and when we are asked why we are Christian, it is not acceptable to answer, “I always have been,” or “I was brought up in a Christian home,” or “I have never known anything else,” or “I don’t know, I just am.”

If being a Christian serves as the cornerstone of our identity and behavior, then it behooves us to know why. And until we have taken time to investigate and learn how God has chosen to be revealed throughout the ages, our true identity will forever remain uncertain.

If you have tried before to read and understand the Bible but found the process daunting or difficult, then join us Sunday mornings at 10:00 a.m. for G2R (Genesis to Revelation).

It’s easier to learn with a guide and in a group. The coffee pot will be on and waiting for you.
